# WARRNAMBOOL'S FLOOD HISTORY TO GUIDE PLAN FOR THE FUTURE

The growth of Warrnambool and new housing stock added to areas near the Merri and Hopkins rivers require planning around flooding.

**W**e can experience flooding from pipes, from rivers and from the ocean. All three in combination can dramatically increase the risk and extent of flooding.

Warrnambool's benchmark flooding experience was the 1946 floods in which 228mm of rain fell within a 48 hour period.

Combined with an extremely high sea it was the worst flood in living memory.



There have been many floods before and after 1946, and we can be sure there will be more to come. Much work has been done to understand how different sized floods will affect the community. A major piece of work was the North Warrnambool Flood Mitigation project which has protected approximately 132 homes from flooding above floor level. More needs to be done as the city expands and other communities like Woodford and Allansford grow.

Warrnambool City Council is working together with Utilis Consulting to develop a Floodplain Management Plan to consolidate all the existing information, and provide direction on future areas

of investment for flood investigations, planning, mitigation and adaptation projects.

Council and Utilis Consulting want to hear the community's views on the future of our floodplains and the Draft Floodplain Management Plan. A community drop-in day will be held at the Pavilion Cafe on Tuesday, July 31 from 9am to 6pm.

## 2018-2019 BUDGET

Further renewal of the city centre, more footpaths and cycle paths and improved public toilets are among the highlights of Council's 2018-2019 budget.

**T**he \$89.2 million budget includes an \$18.8 million capital works program.

"We've attracted more grant funding and endeavoured to be as efficient as possible with the resources we have," Mayor Cr Robert Anderson said.

"The capital works program also includes completion of the Simpson Street stormwater project and a new water treatment plant at AquaZone."

Council will continue to deliver a range of services including meals on wheels, personal care, respite, home care and senior citizens programs.

The budget also details support for family services including immunisation, preschools, maternal and child health, child care, family day care and youth services.

Arts and culture items include support for the Warrnambool Art Gallery, Lighthouse Theatre and the Warrnambool Library.

The approved budget aims to maintain Council's low risk financial status and deliver a modest surplus of \$0.2 million.

Council's waste management charge has increased from \$287 to \$356 per household.

"In percentage terms it's a significant increase and there were similar costs across most Victorian councils," Cr Anderson said.

"It covers the rollout of a Food Organics, Garden Organics (FOGO) collection service to more properties and also the increase in cost to process recyclable materials.

"Unfortunately almost all councils across Victoria will be forced to increase their waste charges to cover the increased cost of processing recyclables.

"As many will know, the major Victorian processor of recyclable materials was sending these materials to China.

"China has cut the quantity of recyclable materials it imports which has meant that a solution to the recycling crisis must be found closer to home.

"At the same time the cost of sending waste to landfill continues to rise as a result of Victorian Government charges.

"In 2018-2019 Council will pay \$32.22 for every tonne of waste sent to landfill.

"A decade ago the landfill levy was about \$9 a ton so over the years there has been a significant increase in the cost to Councils – and therefore ratepayers – to properly process waste."



## CODE BREAKERS: WOMEN IN GAMES

Opening on July 21

Did you know that almost 50 per cent of gamers are women?

Maybe, but how much do you know about the integral role that women have played shaping gaming? Though they still comprise less than 10 per cent of the industry, the contribution of women is enormous.

The Warrnambool Art Gallery is delighted to present Code Breakers: Women in Games by the Australian Centre for the Moving Image (ACMI), the first Australian exhibition celebrating the achievements of women working in the games industry. Whether it's making commercial hits or indie titles, these women know games, contributing as directors, programmers, developers, artists, writers, producers and designers.

The exhibition is full of playable games

You can crush bullies in Ninja Pizza Girl, run with animals in Armello or race suped-up cars in Need for Speed: No Limits, with games made by emerging and established makers. From platformers, RPGs and digital board games to graphical adventures and puzzlers, there's something for everyone, at every skill level.

Alongside the fun, Code Breakers ponders important questions in the post-Gamergate landscape: How do women carve a path in an industry that has historically been hostile towards them? How do we encourage diversity? What does a more inclusive games industry look like? Each maker reflects on the sometimes challenging journey they've made in this male-dominated industry, revealing the human stories behind their games.



## FULL STEAM AHEAD AT THE WAG

The Warrnambool Art Gallery (WAG) is set to launch a new digital art program that aims to give girls the skills and confidence to forge careers in science, technology, engineering, arts and maths (STEAM).

Recent statistics released by Google show that in 2016 only three per cent of applicants for university science, engineering, technology and maths subjects were women, whereas 75 percent of future jobs will require these skills.

The Girls Are Full STEAM Ahead program has been made possible with a \$50,000 grant from the Victorian Government.

WAG Director Vanessa Gerrans said that the program would use art and creativity to challenge the prevailing perception of many girls that science, technology, engineering and maths aren't for them.

"Through the application of technology in an arts institution and the development of an extensive program of events, activities, exhibitions and outreach programs, WAG will engage with female-identifying students in south-west Victoria on this important topic," she said.

"The Girls Are Full STEAM Ahead program will empower girls from across the region by giving them the knowledge and experience to become the next generation of digital and multimedia artists, technical professionals and entrepreneurs."

Participants will learn skills in digital and 3D printed jewellery design, coding, animation, game development, film visual effects and entrepreneurship. They will create digital artworks that will be shared with the community via an exhibition on the digital display wall outside the gallery.

The project builds on the WAG's partnership with the Warrnambool Robotics Academy. The Academy of Interactive Entertainment and Geek Girl Academy are also supporting the project.

Professional development programs will also be offered to local educators about the ways STEAM learning can be integrated into all areas of the curriculum.

Girls Are Full STEAM Ahead will be a perfect companion to the current exhibition Once Women Won the Vote, which celebrates the contributions of women to society, and the upcoming ACMI exhibition Code Breakers: Women in Games, which showcases the achievements of women in the games industry.

## GREEN WARRNAMBOOL

Green Warrnambool sets a new vision for the city: that Warrnambool will be the most sustainable regional city in Australia.

This is a high-level, overarching strategic document that guides a suite of new and existing strategic plans and actions.

The plan contains six goals which are:

- Zero Warrnambool** – we will have zero net greenhouse gas emissions.
- Adaptable Warrnambool** – Council and its community will be prepared and resilient in a changing climate.
- Wise Warrnambool** – we will send zero recoverable waste to landfill and reduce litter and pollution.
- Naturally Warrnambool** – where we will enhance and protect our environment and biodiversity.
- Blue Warrnambool** – we will ensure our water is protected, conserved and unpolluted.
- Green Warrnambool** – our green spaces will be thriving and connected and our food sourced locally.

The actions are a combination of policy and planning documents, data collection and on-ground implementation actions with over 50 Council led actions and 40 community actions.

The targets are ambitious and it is acknowledged that meeting them requires a cultural shift in how we will live and develop as a city.

Green Warrnambool has been developed in conjunction with the Warrnambool 2040 Project and the Environment and Planning Advisory Committee and will supersede the previous Environmental Sustainability Strategy 2008-2013.

## NEW PLAYGROUND AT STANLEY STREET

The renewal of the Stanley Street playground in South Warrnambool has received the seal of approval from nearby kinder kids.

The project was completed last month, with the South Warrnambool Kindergarten putting it through its paces in its "first play".

The \$90,000 renewal was funded via Council's Playground Renewal Program.

The playground complements the seven-metre Ngeerrang (Mother) and Ngart (Daughter) Mural which was created by mother daughter team Fiona Clarke and Patricia McKean in February.

The mural was a partnership between council, Regional Arts Victoria, the Gunditjmarra Aboriginal Co-Operative, Amazon Printing, Scope Galleries, Hammonds Paints, Warrnambool Art Gallery and the South Warrnambool Kindergarten Parent Committee.

A rejuvenated playground in Crawley Street will be completed in July.

## \$150,000 FOR AUSTRALIAN-FIRST CHINA READINESS PROGRAM

The Warrnambool City Council has secured \$150,000 of Victorian Government funding to lead an Australian-first business mentoring program to help local businesses capitalise on the booming Chinese tourism industry.

The grant was announced by Minister for Regional Development Jaala Pulford as part of the Regional Skills Fund.

The China Host Program will see a core of Great Ocean Road businesses take part in a series of high-level workshops and activities to create the industry-leading services and experiences that will help take Chinese tourism in the region to the next level.

The program will include one-on-one mentoring, advanced marketing support, identification and analysis of world-class case studies and an introduction to popular Chinese social media platform WeChat.

It will also include a series of workshops outlining an array of simple measures that all businesses can take to encourage patronage by Chinese visitors.

The program will be delivered by industry experts Asialink Business, the Australian Tourism and Export Council, Dragon Trail and South West TAFE.

Warrnambool City Council Manager Economic Development and Investment Shaun Miller said that this support from the Victorian Government will allow for the expansion of the award winning

Changchun sister city relationship and the Warrnambool China Bureau.

“It reinforces our city’s China Strategy that aims for Warrnambool to be the leading ‘China Ready’ city in Australia,” he said.

“This is an intensive leadership program that will provide participating businesses with the tools and support to ensure our local service levels are internationally renowned while also becoming global leaders in catering for the burgeoning Asian tourism market.”

The project is supported by the Warrnambool City Council, Moyne Shire Council, Corangamite Shire Council, the Warrnambool Tourism Association, Great Ocean Road Regional Tourism and South West TAFE.

“The way many successful businesses operate is changing rapidly, however access to world-class initiatives and case studies has never been better,” he said.

“Starting a business with a new idea can be daunting, but the Great South Coast

Small Business Festival will be a wealth of information for people looking to make their good idea a reality.

“When you mention start-ups, the image most people get is of twenty-somethings in Silicon Valley working on the next great app. In truth, it’s just someone with an innovative idea who puts that idea into practice.”

## PRIME LOCATION FOR PRIME MARKET

While the South West Victorian Livestock Exchange in Warrnambool still sees the greatest number of cattle sold for the best prices in the region, its location on the fringes of the largest city in south-west Victoria means there are even more benefits, according to regular buyers and sellers.

The saleyards is situated alongside a renowned strip of agricultural retailers and is less than a five minute drive to the city centre.

Third-generation farmer Jim Madden from Tower Hill said that while the saleyards were conveniently located for him, he knows many other farmers who travel from further afield to buy and sell their cattle while making the most of all of the services you'd expect in a city with a population of over 34,000.

"I've been very happy with the service we receive here at the yards and the prices," he said.

"It's handy for a lot of people to the west, east and north of the area. Warrnambool is a good location and most people are

coming here to do business aside from just cattle.

"If you live further out, where you just don't drop everything and come to town when you want something, you can tie it in with your visit to the saleyards on a Wednesday.

"You come here, you meet the same faces and it becomes a bit of a social day out on a Wednesday too."

Richard Page from Penshurst puts about 200 head through the Warrnambool yards each year and for him, a trip to the capital of the Great South Coast is a Wednesday tradition at certain times of the year.

"On June 10 I celebrated 42 years of farming, and I've sold at the Warrnambool

saleyards for that entire 42 years," he said.

"If we have appointments in town, we make them on a Wednesday."

He said that he used sale days to visit accountants, mechanics, agricultural supply shops and "whatever else the town has to offer".

"It's one of the main places we shop," he said.

"In Warrnambool, you can drop the cattle off and spend the rest of the day shopping.

"We've raised six children, so whoever was about would come in too.

"If you're looking at tractors, if you want to get your ute serviced or even just to get some new shoes, it's all there."

## A MINUTE WITH THE MAYOR

Council has adopted its budget for 2018-2019 and also a revised version of our four-year Council Plan.

It's a responsible budget where Council has allowed for an increase in rates in line with the Victorian Government's rate cap.

We'll maintain the delivery of all our key services to the community and have made commitments to maintain our assets.

The City Centre Renewal work continues this financial year with the completion of the work in Liebig Street followed by further work in Koroit Street including the intersection of Koroit and Kepler streets, where we will introduce pedestrian priority crossings similar to those in Liebig Street.

On the capital works front we'll see the upgrading of public amenities in the botanic gardens and in Swan Reserve.

This work continues an ongoing program to improve public amenities that was adopted by Council following "The Loo Review" in 2013.

While the Council Plan is a document to cover four years of the Council operations (2017-2021) it is required to be revised each year.

This year the main revisions in the Council



Plan include the additions of the four main "visions" developed by the Warrnambool community during consultation for the development of the long-term city plan: Warrnambool 2040.

The visions are ambitious and reflect a community striving for excellence.

They are:

- In 2040 Warrnambool will be Australia's most resilient and thriving regional economy;
- In 2040, Warrnambool will be Australia's most liveable regional city;
- In 2040 Warrnambool will be the most sustainable regional city in Australia; and,
- In 2040, Warrnambool will be a city where all people thrive.

## CITY CENTRE RENEWAL

The City Centre Renewal construction team has made great progress on the southern end of Liebig Street and will soon begin work on the kerbing at the intersection of Timor and Liebig streets.

The work will start on Monday, July 9, and from Thursday, July 12, the northern half of the roundabout will be closed for up to three weeks.

East-bound traffic can still access Timor Street between Gilles and Liebig streets but to exit the block motorists will be required to complete a U-turn in front of the Lighthouse Theatre.

From July 30 the construction crew will

return to complete road paving at the intersection of Liebig and Koroit streets. This will require closure of the northern half of the roundabout.

East-bound Koroit Street traffic will need to U-turn at the public toilets while south-bound Liebig Street traffic will need to U-turn in-front of Black Pepper.

From Monday, August 6, a full closure will take effect to enable the paving crew to install the final asphalt layer and line mark to the entire intersection.

This will affect west-bound Koroit Street traffic and motorists will be required to complete a U-turn at the Bendigo Bank corner.

While the timing of work is subject to favourable weather the intersection is expected to re-open to traffic at 9am on Tuesday, August 7.

No on-street parking will be available in Liebig Street between Faulls Shoes and Timor Street under the full intersection closure.
