Christmas will come early to the Warrnambool CBD.

A Very Liebig Christmas will be a family-friendly community street festival that aims to support local business as part of the City Centre Renewal project.

This night of fun and festivities will be held on Friday November 30.

"This event aims to attract visitors from across western Victoria to spend the evening in the Warrnambool CBD shopping and celebrating the end of the renewal works and kicking off the festive season," said Warrnambool City Council Manager Economic Development Shaun Miller.

"This unmissable night will see Liebig Street transformed into a Christmas-themed wonderland with street stalls packed with Christmas gift ideas, entertainment from street performers, a range of alfresco dining and the opportunity to be the first to see the new city Christmas lights and decorations."

The event will be run and organised by the Liebig Street Leadership Group.

"This group of innovative, local business people understand the importance of coming together to celebrate as a community and the economic and placemaking benefits associated with it," Mr Miller said.

Group member Adele Griffin from the Commonwealth Bank said that the event would be a launch for Christmas in Warrnambool.

"It's about bringing everyone into the centre of Warrnambool, into the CBD, where everything happens," she said.

"With the leadership group, whenever we've gone to Council with an idea they've fully supported us.

"They have delivered a lot of initiatives based on our discussions together from Find the Five, all the laneway activations, the competitions, the free advertising on the radio for businesses, there has always been something.

## WARRNAMBOOL WELLBEING WEEK

Sharing practical strategies for mental health promotion and positive parenting is the aim of Warrnambool's inaugural wellbeing week.

The event will be held over four consecutive nights from August 13 at the Lighthouse Theatre.

Sessions are targeted at students, parents, carers, sporting clubs and the wider community and are free for everyone to attend.

Speakers include 2017 Young Australian of the Year for Victoria and Beyond Blue Ambassador Jason Ball, who will be speaking about mental health and homophobia on August 13 while Game Changers will discuss the importance of a positive culture at sporting clubs on August 14.

The Rites of Passage Institute will discuss the key elements that make up a rite of passage on August 15 while Project Rocket will be presenting on the strengths and challenges of navigating the online world on August 16.

## GEOSCIENCE TAKES TO SOUTH-WEST SKIES

An upcoming aerial survey of south-west Victoria will measure extremely small variations in the Earth's natural gravity field to help inform the Victorian Government's geoscientific studies into the potential for new discoveries of natural gas.

The survey will be carried out by two small, fixed wing aircraft carrying state-of-the-art technology.

The planes will fly in public airspace at an altitude of 150 metres, increasing to 300 metres in built-up areas.

The survey will commence in August 2018 and is expected to take 12 weeks. It will cover a large portion of the Otway Basin - approximately 16,000 sqkm.

The planes will be seen over Colac Otway, Corangamite, Moyne, Glenelg, Southern Grampians and Warrnambool as well as up to 18km off the coast.

In most instances, the plane will only need to fly over a location once. The survey will have no impact on land or sea-based activities or the environment.

The data collected will help Victorian Government geologists interpret the shape of sub-surface geological rock structures and refine geological models of the Otway Basin, which are being built as part of the Victorian Gas Program.

Fracking or any other unconventional gas extraction is not included in the program as it is permanently banned in Victoria.

# PREPARE TO BE INSPIRED

The 2018 Great South Coast Small Business Festival is under way, with placemaking expert Gilbert Rochecouste launching the event at Beers and Big Ideas on August 1.

Mr Rochecouste, a former general manager at Chadstone shopping centre, has spent the past 30 years creating vibrant places, and was a key driver behind the Melbourne laneway renaissance.

Through his business, Village Well, he has worked with more than 5000 small businesses, and he said the most important thing for all successful businesses was to embrace change.

"Businesses can get into what I call "tunnel vision" and they get stuck in their own boxes," he said.

"They need to expand their skill sets, they need to be aware of what's going on in the world and they need to understand the trends.

"It's very important for businesses... to be continually innovating and improving themselves.

"Businesses run on creativity and innovation and it doesn't cost big money.

"When people improve their own businesses, the DNA of the city improves."

Mr Rochecouste's advice for new businesses, or businesses looking to expand, was to get started with simple, small steps.

"It's about starting and starting small. Rome wasn't built in a day," he said.

"It's like the laneways in Melbourne. We started small. We started back in the mid '80s and it just kept going.

"It was a fine grain that built up and became a really powerful story and destination for surprise, delight, wonder and discovery that Melbourne is known for."

## AN ENCLOSED DOG PARK FOR WARRNAMBOOL

Where should Warrnambool's enclosed dog park go?

This is the question Warrnambool City Council is looking for residents to help answer.

Council has identified three potential sites: Harris Street Reserve, the old BMX track site on Queens Road and Victoria Park off Koroit Street.

An approximately 4000sqm area has been marked out at each location. The trial will start on July 20 and will run for three weeks.



Community feedback will then inform Council's decision on where a permanent enclosed dog park should be located.

Warrnambool Mayor Robert Anderson said that the trial will give dog owners, nearby residents and Council an opportunity to assess each site.

"While Warrnambool already has 25 designated off-lead areas, enclosed dog

parks are set aside exclusively for dogs and their owners," he said.

"They provide a space for dogs to socialise and exercise without the risk of impacting on the enjoyment of other park users.

"Enclosed parks provide owners with more surety around the safety of their dog, especially for younger dogs who may

still be in training.

"They allow owners to practice voice control of their dog in a secure environment."

## HUNDREDS COMMIT TO CLEANER OCEANS

The need for an ongoing program to tackle the problem of marine plastics on local beaches has gained momentum with hundreds of people supporting the initiative.

Fourteen beach monitoring sites have been set up along the coast from Nullawarre through to Yambuk as part of the new Clean Oceans Collective program.

The foundation is a nationally-recognised marine debris organisation that aims to create change on a large scale by preventing rubbish from ending up in the ocean in the first place. It is supported by a network of volunteers who contribute information about ocean debris to a national database and help create source reduction plans.

More than 600 people, including community volunteers, school students, teachers, university and government representatives attended four launch events in May.

Clean Oceans Collective community representative Lachie Farrington, said members wanted to give everyone a chance to get involved, and that a presentation by Tangaroa Blue Foundation founder Heidi Taylor provided a clear way of achieving tangible results.

"We all have a role to play locally in addressing plastics in our oceans," he said.

"Heidi's presentations gave us a way forward using data from beach clean-ups to get to the source of the plastic rubbish and do something about it.

"It was especially great to see so much interest from schools, I think because it is so easy to use the resources and set up a monitoring site. Deakin University are also really keen to be involved so we can benefit from their expertise too."

Ms Taylor said she was looking forward to returning in October for the next step of helping the group analyse the monitoring data and develop source reduction plans.

She was particularly impressed with the level of government support, with Warrnambool and Moyne councils, the Glenelg Hopkins Catchment Management Authority, Wannon Water, and the Environmental Protection Authority all on board.

"Often I come to these workshops and there is a whole heap of passionate community volunteers and the hard work is engaging the government stakeholders. This group is way ahead," she said.

# CRAWLEY STREET PLAYGROUND READY FOR ACTION

A new playground in Crawley Street has been completed.

The new structure includes a slide, climbing and balancing elements, monkey bars and a spinner.

A new concrete footpath, seating and natural landscaping have also been installed.

The playground is expected to be able to be enjoyed by the local community for at least the next 20 years, and was completed as part of Council's annual Playground Renewal Program.



## MARSHALL THE KING OF SWING AT LAKE PERTOBE

A new accessible swing set has been installed at Lake Pertobe, with Marshall Hayhoe, 3, among the first to try it out.

The timber A-frame swing has two seats: one for toddlers and one for older children. Both have high backs to offer maximum support and also include adjustable harnesses.

A new concrete footpath leads to the swing, which has soft rubber matting around its base. The swing is also close to the accessible toilet facilities and a barbecue.

Marshall's mother, Corrina, said that she and her son were delighted with the new play equipment.

"It's awesome to be able to take my son to a playground and do what others take for granted with their children," she said.

"To see him happy and able to associate with other children is all I want.

"If you know him, laughs and smiles are rare. To have him in the swing and see how happy he is, I can't describe how awesome it is."

Cr Sue Cassidy said that integrating accessible play equipment into existing playgrounds is important.

"It's not just about providing children of all abilities the opportunity to play, it's the fact that all children can play together," she said.

"To see Marshall's happy face, and mum's happy face, is unreal."

The swing is in alignment with the recently adopted Lake Pertobe Master Plan.

The \$36,000 project was funded via the Warrnambool City Council's Rural Access Capital Works Fund.

## TELL US ABOUT YOUR FAVOURITE PLAY SPACES

Play spaces are among the city's most treasured assets.

The Warrnambool City Council is looking to create a new strategy to help guide investment in play spaces over the next 15 years.

Play spaces are areas of public open space that include some form of play equipment. While playgrounds are the most common feature, this strategy will also look at everything else in Warrnambool's play spaces from trees, to seats, to barbecues.

Warrnambool City Council Coordinator Asset Management John Finnerty encouraged everyone who visited the city's play spaces, regardless of how often, to complete a short survey.

"We are looking to find out which play spaces the community use most, why they like them and how they get there," he said.

"The Warrnambool City Council maintains 58 play spaces, one skate park and one fitness area. This doesn't even include the sporting grounds, AquaZone or all of the other great places to have fun and get active in the municipality.

"With new play spaces costing upwards of \$100,000 they are significant pieces of community infrastructure, and we need the community's help to ensure we are investing in the right areas."

The survey allows respondents to provide feedback on up to three play spaces that they visit.

## STATE FUNDING FOR WOLLASTON BRIDGE REPAIRS

The Warrnambool City Council has welcomed \$195,000 in Victorian Government funding to help preserve the historic Wollaston Bridge.

The grant was announced by Labor Member for Western Victoria, Gayle Tierney MP, and was made available via the Living Heritage Program.

“Warrnambool is a place that is immensely proud of its heritage and the Wollaston Bridge is one of our city’s most iconic structures,” said Warrnambool Mayor Robert Anderson.

“When built, it was a private entrance for the Wollaston

Estate, now it’s a key link for pedestrians as well as a place for quiet reflection, bird watching or even painting.

“I’d like to thank the Victorian Government for their support of one of our state’s most important 19th century bridges.”

The grant will be used to replace the bridge’s structural timbers.

## GROUP FITNESS IMPROVEMENTS AT AQUAZONE

Group fitness classes at AquaZone are set to get even better with new classes, new equipment and new technology coming in August.

The biggest innovation will be the introduction of video displays to assist fitness instructors to deliver their classes.

The videos will include demonstrations of correct actions as well as interval times. This frees up instructors to move around the class and spend more time with individuals.

AquaZone Manager Ray Smith said that the moves were aimed at providing more flexibility for instructors and members.

“Our instructors will still lead by example for much of the class, but they are looking forward to being able to move around the room more freely to help and motivate participants,” he said.

“The classes will also begin using Team Beats software as part of the MyWellness app, which will allow instructors to monitor the heart rates of members who wear fitness trackers.

“Team Beats also allows people to accurately track their activity in group fitness classes, and we know how important a motivator this can be for a lot of people.”

Mr Smith said that the videos displays also allow “virtual classes” to be run in off-peak times.

“We have a lot of group fitness classes in the morning and evening, but the room is underutilised in the middle of the day, so the virtual classes give our members more opportunities to exercise how they want at a time that suits them,” he said.

“If people can’t make it to the instructor-led class for whatever reason, then the virtual classes will be there as a back-up.

“We have trialled virtual classes in the spin room, and they have worked well.”

Strong by Zumba will debut at the centre in early August, new Les Mills SMARTsteps will be rolled out and a brand-new group fitness timetable will also begin, with more classes than ever.

August is the month for encouraging and growing Warrnambool businesses.


The Great South Coast Small Business Festival is now under way and provides great opportunities for people who are in business or thinking about starting a business to get some advice and inspiration.

## INDEPENDENCE DAY WITH A SPIN

While July 4 is Independence Day in the United States, local teenager Maddi Roberts was celebrating her own independence having passed her driving test.

Maddi was supported by the Warrnambool Moyne L2P Learner Driver Mentor Program, which pairs people who may face barriers in attaining their 120 hours of practice with volunteer driving mentors.

July also marked eight years since her mentor, Ian Rees, began as a volunteer supervising driver.

Warrnambool Moyne L2P Program Officer Deon Cameron said that volunteers like Ian had helped hundreds of young people get their driver's licence who may not have been able to otherwise.

"Ian's ability to work calmly with particularly anxious new drivers and eke

out their strengths to develop their skills and confidence is remarkable," he said.

"He is a master at successfully supporting participants in learning to drive a manual car when they have been adamant that they could never manage the skill."

Fully prepared with enough valuable experience Maddi took her test in the manual L2P car and passed with flying colours.

Ian was able to share in this event, as Maddi requested that he accompany her for her warm-up drive beforehand. Ian was also happy to wait while she took the test and share in the news of the end result on her return.

"To see the radiant smiles on both faces when Maddi received news of her success in achieving her licence was priceless," Mr Cameron said.

"Maddi was especially grateful for the opportunity to learn to drive with L2P and will be a great advocate for the program."
