## MINUTE WITH THE MAYOR

A warm welcome to all the people visiting Warrnambool over the holiday season.

Warrnambool over December and January has much to offer whether you are a visitor staying a few days or a resident enjoying Christmas and New Year from the comfort of home in Australia's most liveable city.

Once again our events team has compiled a great selection of activities to entertain all ages and many are free or low cost.

The Beachfest guide is available at various locations around Warrnambool including the Visitor Information Centre.

This is a time of year when people are often in a more reflective mood and when I look back over the past 12 months we see plenty has happened in the city.

In September we were independently judged Australia's most liveable city by independent global research company, Ipsos. This is really significant and it's something that we should all feel really proud of, particularly because key parts of the assessment in the Ipsos study were about more intangible elements such as feeling safe and having a sense of community.

We have planning under way on really important projects including the \$11 million Reid Oval redevelopment; the \$2.9 million Lake Pertobe upgrade and the \$20.25 million Learning and Library Hub.

We're also asking the community to have input on our dredging strategy for Lady Bay.

We've been able to observe how Liebig Street worked following the City Centre Renewal and I believe it has been a success. While small businesses historically



come and go we have seen a number of new businesses open in our main street adding diversity and interest. The dining precinct is close to full occupancy and we are seeing positive and proactive traders driving initiatives including A Very Liebig Christmas. Our other retail and commercial precincts in east, west and north Warrnambool also appear to be buzzing and are providing specialist services and retail choice within their neighbourhoods.

I've also noticed vehicle traffic moving more calmly through the city centre and drivers and pedestrians giving each other a wave of acknowledgement as they use the pedestrian-priority crossings. I know that for some motorists these crossings have taken some time to get used to but I think that putting people first is the right thing to do.

We have not reduced vehicle access to the city, we have simply changed the way cars move through the city centre.

On behalf of Council I would like to wish everyone a safe and happy festive season.




### COOK UP A COLLAGE

## A NEW ADVENTURE AWAITS AT LAKE PERTOBE

New designs for the Lake Pertobe Adventure Park have been released.

The plans are inspired by the community consultation undertaken over 2017 and 2018 that led to the development of the Lake Pertobe Master Plan.

"The plans are really exciting and will help ensure that Lake Pertobe remains a wonderful drawcard for residents and visitors over coming decades," Warrnambool Mayor Cr Tony Herbert said.

"There is a greater variety of equipment for children to play on, proposed planting that will provide more shade and shelter and there will be more all-abilities equipment.

"The community's vision that was captured in the Lake Pertone Master Plan is reflected in these designs. "It's a safe environment but still provides plenty of excitement with

a 9m climbing tower, water play area, swings, a cubby, sand play spaces and agility challenges.

"We're sharing the plans and asking the community to let us know if there is anything we might have missed in the design."

The \$2.9 million Lake Pertobe upgrade is being funded in equal parts by the Australian Government's Building Better Regions Fund and Warrnambool City Council.

The playground is a component of the upgrade which will also include a new toilet block at McGennan Car Park, all-abilities paths and a walking trail which will acknowledge the environment and culture of the space.

## GLASS BIN TRIAL

Council will begin a trial glass waste collection on February 4 next year.

Mid-way through 2019 Council consulted with community on the possibility of having a separate bin for collecting glass only.

Separating glass from other recyclables – such as paper and plastics - reduces the possibility that recyclable contaminated with broken glass will be sent to land instead of recycled.

The survey asking about a fourth bin for glass revealed support for the idea when combined with a fortnightly, instead of weekly, garbage collection.

Once the trial is under way Council will monitor its effectiveness on a rolling monthly basis to determine the future of the collection.

Residents in the trial area will be supplied with a new 140 litre garbage bin which will be emptied on a fortnightly basis along with the remaining 3 bins (FOGO, glass only, and recycling) on a rotating fortnightly basis.

Residents living in areas selected for the glass collection trial have been notified by mail.



## CHRISTMAS BINS

Christmas, it's a time for celebration, for giving and for eating lots of delicious food.

It's also a time for generating a lot of recyclables.

So over Christmas and New Year every household in Warrnambool will receive an extra recycling collection.

This means everyone will have their recycling bin collected along with your rubbish bin on both weeks between 22 December and 3 January, regardless of when your regular recycling week is.

The FOGO collection is unchanged and for households which have bins collected on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, please have your bins out on the street by 6pm.

## PREFERRED PAVILION CONCEPT, TURF SPECIES CHOSEN FOR REID OVAL

Council has selected a preferred concept design for the \$11 million Reid Oval Redevelopment.

The concept was created in close consultation with Reid Oval user groups and stakeholders, who will continue to be involved in the detailed design process to follow.

The design team considered three options, with the preferred concept for a single-storey building that includes modern player and spectator amenities, social rooms, office administration space for regional sporting bodies and an undercover area for spectators.

The pavilion design includes two main change rooms which can be partitioned to create four separate change rooms, creating appropriate facilities for male, female, junior and senior games to be hosted on the same day.

For the first time, there will be separate male and female umpire change rooms. These rooms will be located separately to the player facilities to maintain an appropriate feeling of security for umpires on game day.

The building will create equitable access for tenant clubs, with the Nestles Cricket

Club, East Warrnambool Football Netball Club and the Warrnambool and District Umpires Association to have social rooms, storage facilities and access to meeting spaces and a gym.

The new facility will meet AFL and cricket regional standards.

There remains the opportunity to use the Warrnambool Football Netball Club social rooms if elevated coaching facilities were required for AFL matches, therefore saving the need to provide elevated space in the new pavilion.

Reid Oval Project Group Chair Cr Sue Cassidy said that the selection of a preferred pavilion concept was an important step towards realising a regional sporting facility that the entire community can be proud of.

“Feedback from stakeholders has been integral in the project, which is Council’s number one health and wellbeing project, reaching this stage,” she said.

“The single storey building was preferred because along with helping to contain costs it will be more easily accessible to all people and it means that we will not be duplicating facilities.

“There will be equal access to the new facilities for all clubs and we’ll have facilities that encourage female participation in sport.

“It is, of course, still a concept and there is scope for fine tuning the design but we are well on the way with the project.”

Council has also called for tenders for the supply of turf for the Reid Oval playing surface.

Turf specialists SportENG have recommended that Santa Ana couch is the most appropriate species of grass, which has been discussed with Reid Oval stakeholders.

Cr Cassidy said that inviting tenders now meant that the grass could be well established over winter and more likely to establish quickly when installed at Reid Oval.

“While it is easy to get excited about the built facilities the ground surface remains just as important,” she said.

“We are opting for Santa Ana couch grass which will provide year-round coverage and we can over-sow this with rye grass in winter.

“In the goal squares we will have some synthetic grass sown in with natural grass to provide greater durability.

“This grass coverage will allow the ground to be used up to 30 hours a week.

“Another important part of the project will be the lighting upgrade to allow football matches to be played at night.”

The turf is scheduled to be installed in the summer of 2020-2021.

## FEEDBACK SOUGHT ON DREDGING OPTIONS

Council is preparing a 10-year dredging strategy for the Port of Warrnambool and will seek community feedback on options for disposal of dredged sand.

The strategy will help ensure that dredging is done in a way that best meets community needs and those who use the port's boat launching facilities.

"Dredging has been carried out at the Port of Warrnambool on behalf of the Victorian Government for many years," Warrnambool Mayor Cr Tony Herbert said.

"It ensures there is enough water depth to make the area around the port navigable and the greater depth also helps diffuse wave energy at the launching ramp.

"Dredging has proven to be effective at reducing the height of waves experienced on the public boat ramp by as much as 40%."



There are four options for disposal of dredged material at the port.

**Option 1.** Disposal of dredged material in specially constructed retention ponds behind the dunes at Worm Bay.

**Option 2.** Disposal of dredged material on to a wide stretch of Lady Bay beach from the Pavilion Café to Warrnambool Surf Life Saving Club (approx.) The deposited sand would be 20m wide and 2m deep.

**Option 3.** Hybrid which is a combination of options 1 and 2. Disposal of some material behind the dunes and some along the beach (up to 5,000 cubic metres of sand placed on the beach to stabilise the dune face).

**Option 4.** Near-shore marine disposal of dredged material. This would create an artificial sand reef. This would remain in place for a period of time before coastal action placed some material on the beach while a portion would be dispersed off-shore.

"Each of the options has advantages and disadvantages," Cr Herbert said.

"Council has a preference and it is option one which sees the sand placed behind the dunes.

"This means that none of the dredged sand re-enters Lady Bay and the sand is also able to be used elsewhere such as in roadbuilding."

Details on each option are available online or in print form at the Civic Centre.

"We're asking the community which of the options they would prefer when it comes to disposal of sand," Cr Herbert said.

"There is a short survey people can fill out once they have read through the pros and cons for each option.

"Lady Bay is a beautiful and fascinating natural asset for Warrnambool and the region.

"It is also a very dynamic stretch of coastline."

## ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR A RATES CONCESSION?

A discount on municipal rates may be available if you are a holder of a Pensioner Concession Card or a veterans' Affairs Gold Card (given for TPI, War Widow, EDA or POW).

The Local Government Act 1989 provides that eligible pensioners can receive a reduction of rates levied. Applications are made in writing by completing an Application for Concession on Municipal Rates and Charges form.

The form is available at the Civic Centre, 25 Liebig Street, or online at [www.warrnambool.vic.gov.au/pension-concession](http://www.warrnambool.vic.gov.au/pension-concession)

When applying for concession, the Pensioner Concession Card or a photocopy of the card must be presented with the application form.

If individual pension details have not changed, it is not necessary to re-apply for the concession each year.

Please note a pension rebate is only

applicable for the applicant's principal place of residence.

A Health Care Card does not entitle the holder to a rate reduction.

## THE RESTORATION OF A WARRNAMBOOL ICON

A Warrnambool icon has been carefully restored.

**W**ollaston Bridge was yesterday officially re-opened after a \$335,000 project to:

- Improve the abutments connecting to the bridge to the path network
- Replace timber cross beams and bracing as critical structural support for the suspension bridge
- Replace deteriorated timber bottom truss, section of top truss and several posts
- Install new decking and kerb in a contemporary arrangement for improved cyclist and pedestrians safety

“There is a lot of emotion and sentiment attached to Wollaston Bridge and it is

wonderful to see it restored and fully functional,” Mayor Cr Tony Herbert said.

“It is a much-loved city icon. It’s a beautiful structure and there is nothing quite like it in our region.

“It is a bridge crossed perhaps by most Warrnamboolians at some stage in their lives.”

“This bridge is important to us – both as a symbol of our past and as a practical way for pedestrians and cyclists to cross the Merri River.

“Congratulations to everyone who had a hand in the restoration on a job well done.

“In particular Council would like to thank Heritage Victoria which provided \$195,000

towards the project to which Council added a further \$140,000.”

While the recent work has restored the structural integrity of the bridge, some minor work will take place next year to improve the safety and aesthetics of the bridge.

“Wollaston Bridge is far from museum piece. It is used daily by many people,” Cr Herbert said.

“Ensuring an old piece of infrastructure meets current expectations will mean that some minor work will be carried out on the bridge next year including the installation of a fall protection system on the balustrade.

“We’ll also replace the sheet metal turrets over the cable roller system on top of the concrete pillars.”

## NEW RULES FOR POOLS

The Victorian Government introduced new safety standards on 1 December 2019, in an effort to prevent drownings of young children in home pools/spas by improving the maintenance process of safety barriers.

**U**nder the new safety standards all pool and spa owners are required to:

1. Register your pool or spa with Warrnambool City Council by 1 June 2020 or within 30 days of completion if the installation is under construction at this date. Download and complete the registration form on Council website - [www.warrnambool.vic.gov.au/swimming-pools-and-spas](http://www.warrnambool.vic.gov.au/swimming-pools-and-spas) - and submit with a one-off lodgement/information search fee of \$79 at the Civic Centre, 25 Liebig Street.
2. Follow the mandatory certification regime. Every 4 years, you will be required to organise an inspection by a private building surveyor or inspector, obtain a certificate of compliance and lodge it with Warrnambool City Council with a lodgement fee of \$20.40.

After the initial registration, Warrnambool City Council will notify the date you need to lodge your first certificate of compliance and the applicable barrier standard for the swimming pool or spa barrier. The lodgement date will depend when your pool and/or spa was constructed:

Category number	Date when pool and/or spa constructed	Certificate of compliance lodgement date
1	Before June 30, 1994	June 1, 2021
2	On or after July 1, 1994, and before May 1, 2010	June 1, 2022
3	On or after May 1, 2010	June 1, 2023

If you do not register your pool and/or spa by 1 June 2020, you will incur a fine of 10 penalty units (\$1,652) in accordance with the new Regulations.

If your pool and/or spa has been removed from the property, please contact Council to arrange a site inspection in order to update our records.


