

# Work around the city

## Flood walls installed along Russells Creek

Work on the \$3.9 million North Warrnambool Flood Mitigation Project has entered its final phase – the installation of flood walls.

When complete, the North Warrnambool Flood Mitigation Project will reduce the risk of flooding to more than 750 properties and in excess of 100 buildings

“The flood walls will average 1.1m in height and span a total length of 1200m,” Manager Infrastructure Development and Projects Justin Hinch said.

The first two stages of the project involved the recontouring of the floodplain and the construction of an additional culvert under Mortlake Rd.

“The flood event at Geelong earlier this year highlighted the risks posed by severe storms,” Mr Hinch said.

“The North Warrnambool Flood Mitigation Project has provided us with an opportunity to help protect property, homes and people in the event of similar storms.”

Flood walls will be installed near La Bella Court, on the north side of Russells Creek from Garden Street to Golden Springs Court and on the south side of the creek from Moore Street to Roache Court.

## Power upgrade at ‘Friendlies’

A power upgrade at the Friendly Societies Park will boost capacity, reliability and mean the Warrnambool Theatre Company won’t need to fire up a generator when they hold rehearsals.

Work on the upgrade will be completed by the first week of April before the start of the football and netball season.

The work includes installation of new switchboards and underground cabling that will run from Hyland Street to the theatre company building via clubrooms and the kiosk.

“The ‘Friendlies’ is a busy place so we’ve endeavoured to schedule the work around major activities,” Warrnambool City Council Recreation and Youth Service Manager Kim White said.

Simon Lucas Electrical Services has been appointed to undertake the works.

The project is funded by Warrnambool City Council, the Victorian Government and the South Warrnambool Football Netball Club.



## New surface and better parking for Kepler St

Kepler Street between Merri and Timor streets is being resurfaced.

Along with the replacement of 4,000sqm of road paving, centre median parking will be removed with 60 degree angle parking along the kerb reinstated.

The \$450,000 project includes:

- bluestone kerb and channel work;
- raised pavement style treatment at each end of the street;
- improvements to bus stops;
- rain gardens at the southern end of the installation of tree surrounds.

While the work is under way the bus stops will be temporarily relocated around the corner in Timor Street and further north Kepler Street between Timor and Koroit streets.

## Upgrade to the Simpson Street tunnel

A key part of Warrnambool’s drainage network – the Simpson Street tunnel – is being upgraded.

The first stage of the \$5.4 million project is now under way.

“The Simpson Street tunnel drains stormwater away from a large area within east Warrnambool and conveys it underneath Simpson Street and the EJ King Reserve to the Hopkins River,” Warrnambool City Council Senior Projects Engineer Rohan McKinnon said.

“At the surface there will be little to see but underground a major engineering project will be in full swing.

“The project has two major stages. The first is the ‘resleeving’ a 200m section of the tunnel to be carried out by a specialist firm, ITS Pipetech, which is experienced in a technique of applying a steel reinforced concrete suited to the Simpson Street tunnel.

Concrete for the project will be sourced from Hanson Ready Mix Concrete in Warrnambool.

ITS Pipetech has established a work base in King Reserve and will have a smaller base set up at a tunnel access point near the intersection of Thompson and Simpson streets.

The second stage of the project will involve the construction of a stormwater retention basin within the Warrnambool Racecourse. “Design details for the second stage of the project are being finalised in consultation with stakeholders at the racecourse.”

The project is fully funded by Warrnambool City Council.

## Happy birthday, WAG

**Warrnambool. 1886. The breakwater was still under construction, the capacity of the Warrnambool hospital is increased to 50 patients and the Warrnambool Museum and Art Gallery officially opens.**

Since that time, the Warrnambool Art Gallery (WAG) as it is now known, has been the centre of creativity and culture in Warrnambool with the much-loved institution celebrating its 130th birthday this year.

This marks the WAG as the third oldest institutional collection in Victoria and the fifth oldest in Australia. The WAG will mark this anniversary with the launch of a publication presenting 130 images from the collection that highlight Warrnambool's cultural evolution.

New works have also been acquired to celebrate the milestone, including a breathtakingly sculpture by Sam Jinks "Unsettled Dogs", a magnificent oil painting celebrating Tower Hill by Hobie Porter, a fine charcoal drawing of the Loch Ard Gorge by David Warren and a suite of prints by Brent Harris.

WAG Director Vanessa Gerrans said that this is an important opportunity to illustrate why particular works were acquired and considered important.

“Works acquired over the life of the gallery tell rich and varied stories and are a remarkable reflection of time and place,”

“The gallery is continuing to develop our collections through acquiring exceptional works of art and these new works represent this commitment.

“I am extremely grateful to the private individuals including our members, benefactors and philanthropists who have made this possible.”

The new acquisitions and the commemorative book were made possible by the Warrnambool Art Gallery Foundation, The Gordon Darling Foundation, The Robert Salzer Foundation and the Friends of the Warrnambool Art Gallery and private donations.

Unsettled Dogs will immediately go on display until June, alongside a new exhibition “The WAG Cycle: evolution of a painting collection”.

## Ocean footage wanted for Fun4Kids project

# New maremma puppy reports for duty

**He's adorable, very playful, he's going to protect Warrnambool's penguins... and he needs a name.**


**W**arrnambool's newest penguin protecting maremma dog has begun training and we're calling on the public to help name him.

The nine-week-old maremma arrived in the city last month and has been settling into his new environment.

The pup will work alongside current guardian dogs Eudy and Tula protecting Warrnambool's penguin colony during the 2016 breeding season ahead of the older dogs' transition to ambassador roles in 2017.

Over 300 people from around the world donated money to go towards the purchase, training and care of two maremma puppies. Over \$25,000 was raised via a campaign on crowdfunding website Pozible.

A second puppy will arrive in Warrnambool in late 2016. Warrnambool City Council Manager Tourism Services Peter Abbott thanked the hundreds of people who made the project possible.



“To say we are excited to have the new dog in Warrnambool would be a massive understatement,”

“The release of Oddball brought worldwide attention to the Middle Island maremma project, with so many people eager to help out however they can and we are so grateful for their support.

“We've decided to get one puppy now and another one later on so that we have a definite top dog. As a pack animal, dogs tend to get along much better this way.

“The puppy has been over to Middle Island for a look already. There were so many new smells, he was beside himself with excitement.

“We have also introduced him to Eudy and Tula, and while it would be fair to say that he is more interested in them than they are in him at the moment, I think they will develop a strong bond over the coming months.”

The puppy won't be on public display at Flagstaff Hill until he settles into his guardian role but people may be able to see him as handlers take him to Middle Island from time to time.

Almost 1000 names were suggested by the community, with a shortlist of the best names now open to the public for voting.

## Walking to school safely

**As schools return for another year, so to do the cohorts of students improving their health, their independence and the environment by walking or riding to school.**

**I**t's never been easier to find a safe way to get to school thanks to handy maps produced for each school, highlighting the best way of getting to school on bike or by foot.

These include the “drop off” points for Part Way is OK, where students who live too far away can be dropped closer to the school but still reap the benefits of walking to school.

Get in touch with your school for a copy of the map. Council crossing supervisors currently help children cross the road at 29 points across the city.

The supervisors help more than 2000 people cross the road each hour, on average.

Warrnambool City Council Travel Smart Officer Nicole Wood said that there was plenty of evidence to support the positive benefits of walking or riding to school.

“Just one in five Australian children is physically active for the recommended one hour each day, and walking to school can go a long way to helping kids achieve this target,” she said.



“Not only is it great for kids' health and independence, it reduces congestion around schools and is great for the environment.

“For parents who aren't sure whether they would like their children to walk to school or not, I'd highly recommend you read the resources on the VicHealth website, as they allay many of the most common concerns.”

## Jubilee Park to be officially opened

## Clean up Warrnambool weekend

Detox Your Home will be held on Saturday March 5 with Clean Up Australia Day activities on Sunday March 6.

Detox your Home is your once a year chance to dispose of unwanted household chemicals such as fuel, herbicides, cooking oil, detergents, turpentine and more, free of charge.

You can bring your items to the Warrnambool Saleyards on Caramut Road for collection between 8am and 4pm. Visit [www.sustainability.vic.gov.au/detoxyourhome](http://www.sustainability.vic.gov.au/detoxyourhome) for a full list of accepted items.

Household paint, batteries and fluorescent lights are not accepted, but can be dropped off for free all year round at Statewide Waste, next to the showgrounds.

You can also help keep Warrnambool looking its best by getting involved in local Clean Up Australia Day activities.

Head to the boat ramp near the breakwater, Russells Creek on Bromfield Street or the carpark left of Proudfoots to join a public clean-up between 10am and noon.

There's no need to do anything before hand, just turn up on the day.

Warrnambool City Council Waste Management Officer Kate McInnes said both programs made it easy for people to give their local environment a helping hand. "Detox Your Home is the perfect time to clean out your garage or shed and responsibly dispose of unwanted chemicals," she said.

"Nasty contaminants such as herbicides or turpentine can wreak havoc on our waterways, so it's important that these are safely disposed of.

"Council, Friends of the Merri Marine Sanctuary and South West Fishcare are calling on all residents to come on down to a Clean Up Australia Day site to help clean up our beautiful city and especially work to keep plastic out of the ocean and waterways.

"It's only a small time commitment required on a Sunday morning and it really does make a big difference, as you'll see by the amount of rubbish we collect in just a couple of hours."

Last year two full skips, one of rubbish and one of recycling, were collected in Warrnambool for Clean Up Australia Day while 288 vehicles visited the Detox Your Home site at the saleyards.

# A minute with the Mayor



**As peak visitor season winds down Council has an opportunity to embark on more capital works and maintenance projects.**

The upgrade to Kepler Street is now in full swing while Council has also started the installation of the flood walls along Russells Creek.

Another major project is happening beneath us. A 200m section of the Simpson Street tunnel, which drains stormwater from a large part of East Warrnambool, is being “re-sleeved”. It’s a critically important job but only a handful of people will ever see the final result!

The new toilets and taxi rank in Gilles Street – which I’m sure many people are looking forward to – are coming along and will look terrific once completed.

Council has also made progress on discussions with VicTrack over a long-term lease of land in the railway precinct that is currently unused. This could provide parking for city centre workers along with TAFE students.

Now, for those of us who wish we could be more active but struggle to find the time to commit to regular team sports, there could be a solution. It’s called Rock Up Netball. It’s starting on March 10. If you’ve not played netball before or considering a return to the sport, just “rock up” from 6pm at the Warrnambool Stadium for an hour of great fun.
